Despite relatively limited bilateral interactions in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the re-

In September 2021, the Foreign Ministers of the two countries met on the sidelines of the United Nations General Assembly session. In May 2021, Prime Minister Imran Khan became the first ever Prime Minister of Pakistan to give a keynote address at the "Future of Asia" conference organized by Nikkei Inc. On the economic and trade front, Toyota Japan has announced a fresh investment of \$100 million for assembling hybrid vehicles in Pakistan.

Looking forward, I am optimistic for the year 2022 and beyond as the sky is the limit for our fraternal rela-

## Marking 70th anniv. of diplomatic ties

Japan and Pakistan have been enjoying close friendly relations through exchanges in various fields such as politics, economy and culture since the establishment of diplomatic ties in 1952. This year marks the 70th anniversary of our ties and many memorial events are organized or planned both in Japan and Pakistan. It is a great opportunity to further advance bilateral exchanges, and to look back on our history of friendship to reaffirm its importance.

Although we still cannot foresee a complete end to the spread of the coronavirus, I feel that we are making gradual and steady progress in our fight against COVID-19 by standing united globally.

Despite numerous restraints, bilateral relations between Japan and Pakistan have been maintained firmly. During the course of the past year, Prime Minister Khan participated through his video message in the International Conference on "The Future of Asia" organized by Nikkei Inc. in May. When the Taliban took control of Afghanistan in August, the Government of Pakistan extended generous support to help Japanese nationals and Afghan staff of the Japanese Embassy and the JICA office to safely depart from Afghanistan. This was followed by the first ever meeting between Foreign Minister Qureshi and then Foreign Minister Motegi on the sidelines of the U.N. General Assembly in September, where a meaningful exchange of views was held on bilateral and regional issues.

On the occasion of the 70th anniversary of the establishment of Japan-Pakistan diplomatic relations this year, I would like to make utmost efforts to further strengthen bilateral relations as the President of the Japan-Pakistan Parliamentarians Friendship League, despite the difficulties posed by the spread of the coronavirus.

I wish to take this opportunity to extend my best wishes for the continued prosperity of Pakistan and further development of friendly relations between Japan and Pakistan.

#### A great moment to share a few promising trends

Pakistan's National Day today is indeed a great moment to share a few promising trends.

First, Pakistan has recently announced the lifting of all coronavirus-related restrictions, following declining infections across the country. All offices and transport have been allowed to operate at full capacity, whereas the ban on indoor dinning has also been lifted, as 70% of the population has now been fully vaccinated.

In January, Pakistan ranked second in The Economist's Global Normalcy Index for COVID-19. The index aims to determine which countries are returning to their pre-pandemic levels, and grades each country using eight indicators split into three categories:

transport, recreation and commercial activity.

Therefore, all Japanese tourists who wish to travel to Pakistan and were holding back because of the pandemic can now plan their trips.

Second, Pakistan's booming IT startup sector is turning out to be a silver lining for the country. According to a recent report, IT startups in Pakistan have raised \$486 million of global capital since January 2021. With the aim to tap into Pakistan's IT talent pool, NUST of Pakistan and Plus W of Japan signed an agreement last week. Facilitated by the Pakistan Embassy Tokyo, the agreement aims to create a foundation for Pakistan's advanced IT human resource exports to Japan.

It is estimated that Japan will need around 800,000 IT engineers by 2030; for which Pakistan could be an attractive source, as the country is becoming a prominent supplier of skilled workers to the world owing to a large proportion of young and educated population.

Third, the future looks promising for Pakistan-Japan business relations. Earlier this month, Pakistani food items attracted a lot of attention at Foodex Japan 2022. In the coming months, the seventh round of High Level Joint Business Dialogue between Pakistan and Japan will be hosted in Islamabad. Pakistan has also conveyed intent to participate in EXPO-2025 Osaka.

### Committee committed to greater business ties


